This is not about us Prof. Kazimierz Ilski

Professor Kazimierz Ilski is a former dean of the Faculty of History. He belongs to the group of people responsible for establishing the LAS program in Poznań. He teaches the class "Traditions of artes liberales". We asked him for a few sentences of reflection related to his subject and the program as such.



What exactly are Liberal Arts and Sciences (LAS)? The name is English, but in the name of the class "Traditions of artes liberales" - we hear Latin. Next to the first, easy answer that LAS is a program which in its first recruitment at AMU attracted a group of well-motivated students, it should be noted that it is also a concept of education and upbringing, which the Greeks described with the word paideia.

It is by no means an anachronistic return to the form of a Greek Academy or Lyceum. However, certain principles determining the shaping of the mental model are worth recalling and, in a modernized shape, worth following. It is about educating a free man and shaping a community of free people - the university as a "community of doubt". After all, bringing together the free citizens of the world doesn't seek to emphasize the ignorance of each other. The goal is to cross the boundaries of what has already been established in an open discussion or to correct what has been established defectively, without being servile to fashions and weathered methodologies.

The point is to ask, in the community of professors and students, every possible question as long as it meets the criteria of logic, so that the thesis can be verified by an antithesis. The freedom of learning includes opening new fields while respecting tradition, accumulation of knowledge in vertical (generational) and horizontal structures, by constant contact with friends from other universities in the East and West. Freedom is not a privilege to waste time, nor is it a privilege to concentrate narcissistically on onself, on ones beautiful, trained body and skills described by the particular disciplines of science in the name of career, profit, or short-term popularity. Paideia is still about the "good life" and awakening the desire to discover the unchanging and harmonious world order.

We started - naturally - from colloquial language

Prof. Krzysztof Skibski

Prof. Krzysztof Skibski is vice-dean for student affairs and education at the Faculty of Polish and Classical Philology. As a member of Liberal Arts and Sciences team, he teaches the class "Polish as the Language of Science". We asked him for a few sentences of reflection related to his subject.

Perhaps it is the circumstances of the first classes with the Liberal arts and sciences group that have a specific impact on the growth of our cognitive enthusiasm. We are aware from the very beginning that the multifactorial nature of the experienced hic et nunc cannot be closed by a scheme.

We initiated joint work, interpreting the world in relation to various disciplines, specialized languages, but also - our individualities. That is why we started our classes on language (science) from colloquial language, from looking at words that seemingly do not surprise us, from reflecting on a language that "perhaps could somehow be overcome" (as Piotr Sommer wrote in a sonnet). We took poetry to reflect on the mechanisms of conceptualization. This is the way we would like to continue this adventure - being aware of the various forms of mediation (even if it is already obvious to us resulting from remote), discussing, getting to know the texts of culture and looking at the language with which we talk (write) about all these discoveries.



If we manage to create a few extensive, problematized footnotes to everyday life (while maintaining forms appropriate for scientific works), then we will probably also discover many things in ourselves. We started and, having wiped the screens of our computers, we work together slowly and quite fast at the same time.

Scientific Council for Liberal Arts and Sciences program comes into being

The new law on higher education in Poland requires that there is a Scientific Council for each field of study, dealing with legal, content and organizational issues. Our program is no exception in this regard.



Therefore, on September 20th this year, prof. Rafał Witkowski, director of the Centre for Liberal Arts and Sciences and vice-rector of our university, handed over appointments to the council to five scientists from our university. With masks on and keeping social distance, with an audience following the event mainly on the Internet, on October 1st at the auditory of Henryk Wieniawski we opened another academic year in the history of our university.

The celebration was particular for one more reason. Prof. Andrzej Lesicki, rector of Adam Mickiewicz University officially stepped off the office. He handed over the emblems of power to his successor, prof. Bogumiła Kaniewska. She is the first woman to hold this office. In her inaugural speech, the rector discussed the crisis of meaning that the idea of the university is experiencing today. I believe in university. I believe in a university that has never been and never will be a corporation, a point factory. We can't rule it technocratically or authoritatively. The university is a beautiful community of wise and responsible people who pursue common goals. She emphasised the issue of the involvement of the university in the matters



outside of it. During the ceremony, prof. Andrzej Kostrzewski from the Faculty of Geography received from the rector the medal Palmae Universitatis Studiorum Posnaniensis. Afterwards, the matriculation of first-year students took place. Prof. Piotr Śliwiński gave a very timely lecture titled Hope in Literature. The ceremony ended with the traditional anthem Gaudeamus.

On September 21st prof. Bogumiła Kaniewska, the rector of AMU, established the Centre for Liberal Arts and Sciences.



The task of the Centre is to coordinate activities related to the program, its promotion and setting further development directions.

On October 14th, the EPICUR European University consortium members met at the University of Amsterdam. The main topic was the issue of multilingualism.






